1 impacts, which might occur as a consequence of such In 2012, the Coast Guard and Maritime 2 Transportation Act amended the Deepwater Port Act to allow the exit of oil and natural gas through these deepwater ports. The subject of this meeting is the public scoping meeting in regards to Blue Marlin 6 7 application to own, construct, and operate, and eventually decommission of a crude oil expert deepwater port in federal waters, as we said, off of Cameron Parish, Louisiana. 10 Blue Marlin's application was received by 11 the Coast Guard and Maritime Administration on 12 October 4, 2020. The EIS includes, among other topics, the purpose and 19 need for the proposed action, a description of 20 alternatives, a description of the affected environment 21 22 and an evaluation of the impacts on the natural and 23 human environment are the proposed actions and 24 alternatives. Information fact sheets about the 25 proposed action and the NEPA and deepwater port

1 licensing process are available for your review at the 2 bluemarlinnepaprocess.com website. An interactive map on the project area is also provided on this website. The Coast Guard and the Maritime Administration work together in processing deepwater port applications. fulfilling this responsibility, input we receive from 6 7 you the public, tribal nations, federal, state, county, and parishes agencies is an important consideration as we draft the final EIS. The Maritime Administration will ultimately 10 decide whether to approve, disapprove or approve the 11 condition or with conditions the license for the Blue 12 Marlin offshore deepwater port project. This decision 13 will include the final decree of the two governors of 14 the adjacent coastal states as well. We encourage your 15 comments during this public scoping meeting on any 16 17 issues related to construction activities on this 18 deepwater port facilities. The ES is being conducted in 16 17 accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act or 18 what we refer to as NEPA. Public involvement is a fundamental aspect of NEPA and is outlined in the Coast 19 20 Guard's environmental policies. As Commander West and Dr. Lopez noted, 21 22 we're now in the early stages of the EIS process called 23 scoping in which we seek early input from the public and 24 on potential impacts and forces of information relating 25 to this potential impact. This phase is known as

1 scoping because we determine the scope of issues that should be included in the EIS. As noted previously, the 2 Maritime Administration began the scoping process by publishing a notice of intent to prepare an EIS in the federal register. The notice of intent and Blue Marlin offshore port application was also distributed to state 6 7 and federal agencies. In addition, the Coast Guard and Maritime 8 Administration distributed the notice of application and notice of intent to a wide range of tribal, county, 10 parish, agencies.
